Will there be traffic chaos around uptown Fredericton on Wednesday?

'Take a deep breath, roll your window down, turn the music up, smile,' says Fredericton mayor

The great Fredericton traffic change of 2016 is only one day away, and the city's new mayor is urging drivers to be patient, change their habits and possibly carpool.

The road closures begin at 9 a.m. on Wednesday. On Wednesday, the Regent Street overpass that crosses Route 8, one of Frederictor's key traffic arteries, will be closed for three months while it's raised and widened by the province.

At the same time, the intersection or Regent and Prospect streets – the busi-est intersection in Fredericton, hand-ling 47,000 vehicles a day – is being reduced to one lane in all four direc-tions so that the intersection can be ex-tensively renovated and upgraded by the city.

"I encourage everybody to be patient (and) change their travel pattern if they possibly can," says Fredericton Mayor Mike O Brien.
"Carpool, ride the bus and be prepared for delays."

"If you are stuck in traffic a bit, take a deep breath, roil your window down, rurn the music up, smile, and we'll all get through this."

O'Brien said the work is necessary, and the Province of New Brunswick has to raise the Regent Street bridge the underside of which was struck by

The Fredericton entrepreneurs are Stephen Dixon, president/founder of Grimross Brewing Corp., and Jennifer Krueger, artist/owner of Estey Cre-

ations.

The program is aimed at helping business leaders improve their chances of succeeding through peer mentoring.

Business leaders tend to often feel alone, said Nancy Mathis, the institute's executive director. So the program, which the participants pay \$20,000 to

Judge approves extension of injunction to let Fredericton horse racing operation continue until end of December

A Court of Queen's Bench judge has agreed to extend an injunction that will allow Horse Racing New Bruns-

agreed to extend an injunction that will allow Horse Racing New Brunswick to continue operations in the Winners Lounge in Fredericton until the end of December. Lawyers for Horse Racing New Brunswick and Fredericton Exhibition Ltd. were before Justice Paulette Garnett Monday morning. At the brief hearing, lawyers for both parties said an agreement had been reached to extend the injunction until Dec. 31, 2016, the last day of the existing lease. Conditions of the agreement included that the parties be in compliance, not in breach, and that Horse Racing New Brunswick pay all taxes and penalties by June 15.

The agreement will also allow exhibition staff to resume normal activities on the property, including prop-

ities on the property, including prop-

ities on the property, including property checks.
Garnett agreed to extend the injunction until the requested date, or pending further order of the court.
The initial injunction application was filed with the court May 19, It claimed Horse Racing New Brunswick was losing money because it was locked out of the facility.
The injunction order was signed May 20. The interlocutory injunction ordered Fredericton Exhibition Ltd. to vacate the premises and allow Horse

vacate the premises and allow Horse Racing New Brunswick to access its

operations.

A lease dispute came to a head last Monday when Horse Racing New Brunswick was a day late on the payment of \$36,000 in property taxes. The Fredericton Exhibition Ltd.

The homogeneity is in how they ap-proach their business, Mathis said.
They've built something strong, they've built something they want to grow, and they're not afraid to say they are not sure where to go next, she said.

They are leaders in their company, with "their hands on the wheel," Mathis said.

"To be in a group like this takes the 'alone' away and gives them more confidence in their decisions as they strive to

Boone said he could already feel the ohesiveness of the group when they

met over the weekend for the final se-lection of the program participants, in an event called "the choosing." "I can just imagine over the year how that's going to develop," Boone said. Boone started his trucking company

12 years ago with 12 refrigerated trucks that haul food and beverage mainly

that haul food and beverage mainly across Canada. Now the company has 58 units, 11 of them company-owned and the rest owner-operated. His son George is now general manager of the company, and he took part in another Wallace McCain institute program, the 2iC program for those second in command. Inat program is aimed at those who perhaps have to deal with a founder-boss who may be a charismatic leader who maybe decent have the level of attention to detail needed to keep the business running smoothly, Mathis said. "So this person is that grout in the organization that bridges between the entrepreneur's amazing vision and the

ganization that oridges between the entrepreneur's amazing vision and the people that need to get the work done on a daily business," she said. The idea behind both programs, as

well as a third called EChO which is for family members moving into leadership in a multi-generational family business, is that people in all these roles – whether founder, second-in-command or moving up in a family business – often have

ing up in a family business – often have no one at the company that is in the same position. So the programs create peer support groups so people can dis-cuss problems and challenges they like-ly all face.

Hore Racing New Brunwick wants to continue operating based on the lease it has with Fredericton Exhibition Ltd. dated Feb. 8, 2016. That lease includes things like conducting, holding promoting, simulcasting of horse races, operating an entertainment and gaming centre and operating a lounge and restaurant. Mike Vokey, the executive director of the Fredericton Exhibition Ltd., said there wasn't much he could say about the case, as the matter is still before the court.

"We'll just have to let it play out. Ob-viously, the injunction is still in effect to they'll still operate," he said. "They clarified our access to the property...in the [initial] injunction, we have horse-men on our board that look after the men on our board that look after the horses and they werent allowed to look after the horses. That was removed to-day. They'll go back to their normal rou-tine and we'll go back to our normal in-spections of the property." Roberta Nixon, executive director for Horse Racing New Brunswick, was al-so present at the hearing but declined to comment.

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
