LEADERSHIP ATLANTIC ENTREPRENEURS JOIN MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

SAINT JOHN – Sarah Albert says she was a kid who was never supposed to make it. Her mother was a heroin addict, and Albert passed through group homes and foster care as a ward of the court, in and out of trouble as a teenager. At 21, she became a single mom, living on social assistance. But she went back to school and got a job at the Royal Bank of Canada.

“I was just one of those kids, and I think that's the neat thing about entrepreneurs, we're all about survival,” said Albert, now president of Moncton-based PGYIN Holding Inc. and a mortgage broker.

“At around 15 years old, I made a choice. I stood in front of a judge one day and I said, ‘No, you have to put me in jail. I need you to help me. I don’t want to be like this. I want to be successful. I want to make it.’ And the rest is history. I’ve been fighting ever since.”

Albert, along with 15 other entrepreneurs, has been selected for the Wallace McCain Institute’s Entrepreneurial Leaders Program, a year-long mentorship of workshops and seminars to help them build better business judgment.

Nancy Mathis, the institute’s executive director, said acceptance to the program is competitive – 415 people applied this year – but once you’re in, it’s a nurturing environment.

The monthly conferences feature guest speakers, often authors or well-known entrepreneurs, and also allot time for the 16 members to share their own knowledge with each other.

“I think it’s going to be an incredible resource in terms of mentors and people that have a great deal of experience in terms of not only how to run a business but successfully run a business,” said Monica Adair, principal architect at Acre Architects in Saint John.

“You just realize that Atlantic Canada is just full of talent. So I feel really humbled by the whole experience to be able to be a part of that group.”

Some of those selected say they’ve felt they needed mentorship at one time or another.

“I knew that there was a need for a product just because people had asked for it and we were able to sell it again and again,” said Ryan Roberts, president and CEO of Managed Markets Rx Solutions Inc. in Saint John. “So I guess the market dictated that we were on the right track. But in terms of mentorship, many times I wonder if I’m making the right decision or are there better ways to do things.”

MMRX is a three-year-old software company that helps pharmaceutical and biotechnology firms control their brand messaging by ordering material such as sales kits, patient education documents or announcements about drug approvals by various insurance companies that meets regulatory requirements.

When Albert was nominated for the program, she hadn’t heard of it before, but she thought it would provide some much-needed support.

“I recognized that I was feeling a bit alone as an entrepreneur and not sure where to turn,” she said. “It’s a lot easier to do it with a group than it is to do it by yourself.”

Albert bought a PropertyGuys.com franchise in Moncton in 2011 and is now spearheading the company’s national mortgage vertical. Starting Monday, all of its online applications and referrals are processed out of the city’s office.

“Our role as the national mortgage brokerage will be to do mortgages and financing for clients across Canada that buy and send privately

and are looking for financial advice and whatnot,” Albert said.

Starting your own business can put you in a vulnerable position, Adair said. She launched Acre with her husband three years ago.

“When we first started – we’re the youngest architecture firm in New Brunswick – we really wanted to take that leap, but we realized when we take that leap, all of a sudden, you’re in charge,” she said.

“You have to get into that place where you’re able to give, to be able to really genuinely say, ‘Let’s make this work.’ And I think the environment’s set to do that properly.”
